
### Khor Wakow Project Looking Back – Moving Forward

It is remarkable what a little faith can do, and that little faith gave us so much confidence in each other and made us accomplish so much for God's glory!!


Thank you for your trust in me and for what we can accomplish together!






#### Girls with corn grinders.

### 2013-2014

In 2013, Khor Wakow Project received a large anonymous donation, and we were anticipating construction of the school to begin in January 2014. Those plans, however, were brought to an abrupt halt when civil war broke out December 2013, just weeks before construction was to begin.

In 2014, a Team was sent to assess the needs of the refugees from the Khor Wakow region living in Ethiopia. Due to instability in the region, no travel was allowed in or around the region during their visit. However, due to this team's visit, thousands of pounds of food were delivered directly to the villages, which sustained the lives of the villagers.





In April 2016, Pastor Hill provided Bible training to 35 refugee pastors. Mrs. Hill trained 12 teachers on lesson planning and classroom management.

November 2016 David and Mrs. Hill were able to get into South Sudan for the first time since the war had erupted.





At the first village, they arrived at, a group of school children greeted Mrs. Hill with a song and sang with her between the Khor Wakow villages.





Another Community Meeting was held in 2017 to address what could be done without a school. The community agreed to cut wood and construct "mud" walls in four villages. KWP provided the cost of the roof. Four Villages were impacted that year and another three the following year.

These two-room structures allowed thousands of children to learn—even during the rainy season. The Christian Youth Activity League (CYAL), a local organization, provided soccer balls and uniforms during this time.

### 2020-2021

In 2020-2021 Khor Wakow Project was finally able to begin building the permanent school—one sandbag and one block made on site at a time! Despite many setbacks, the permanent school was completed in September 2021. We are currently serving **370 children**!

We employ twelve teachers, three security guards, several coordinators, a finance manager, and a logistics officer. The school includes nine classrooms, a nurse's office, an administrative office, and a storage room.



### 2022

A well for the Muon Village was completed August 2022. It took three (3) years to accomplish because of unrest in South Sudan. It was finally finished at the end of August 2022.
